

What is a Cadet's time commitment?



General Expectations

- Be Respectful and Inclusive
- Put in Effort
- Bring a water bottle
- Plan to keep phones in pockets and on silent
- Communicate
- Be Responsible

New cadets will usually need parents help, but success will depend on taking personal responsibility for kit, timings, and communication.

The senior cadets and staff will be encouraging new cadets to develop these skills.

How we communicate:

- Weekly updates on Facebook
- "Phone Through"- Senior cadets are given a section (group of 10 or less cadets) to touch base with every week
- Emails- We try to limit emails. You already get too many! The CO will send emails for larger timeframes giving a forecast of upcoming events. The Training Officer or Administration Officer may email about things that pertain to your cadet specifically. The Sponsoring Committee will email regarding volunteer needs and meeting notices.
- Permission Slips: Blanket permission to participate in cadet activities is part of registration, but we still send home permission slips as a way of getting details home and ensuring your awareness.
- Website: The corps calendar is updated on our website. It's a google calendar so you can subscribe to it by adding it to your current account.

What is expected of Parents?

Read and reply	Read and reply to periodic emails. Return forms promptly.
Relay	Relay messages to cadets if they don't have their own phone and encourage them to keep track of weekly details
Attend	Attend parent meetings (no more than 1 per month- usually less)
Support	Support 2 fundraising or community events per year

More about the Parent meetings

The Cadet Organization is operated through a sub-branch of the military, called Cadets and Junior Canadian Rangers (CJCR) and is staffed primarily by Cadet Instructor Cadre (CIC) Officers, who are a sub-branch of the Reserves.

Funding for the Cadet Program comes from the National Defence Budget. Additional funding that allows for more flexibility is provided through the support of the Army Cadet League of Canada (ACLC).

Every Army Cadet Corps has a Local Sponsoring Committee (LSC) that is a branch of the ACLC and is primarily composed of parents of cadets. These LSCs are an integral part of the Cadet corps and we cannot operate without them. Each LSC is a registered society and requires quorum at meetings and an elected board. The Chair of our LSC will send email invites to these meetings and it is essential to the success of The Corps that parents participate.

More about fundraising

At 2136, we are lucky to have the Bay Street Armoury as our parade location at no cost. When we raise funds, they pay for:

- New/additional sports, music and outdoor equipment
- Activities that fall outside of the DND funding model (fun activities like wild play or pizza nights/dinners)
- > Office supplies and tech
- > Awards

Fundraising activities are chosen by the LSC except for one activity that our corps does every year. 2136 Supports the Victoria Highland Games on the Victoria Day long weekend as our main fundraiser so it's important that families prioritize cadets for this weekend.

Red Star -2nd Year

-13-14years old

-expands on Green star concepts and introduces leadership



Silver Star -3rd Year

-14-15 years old

-introduces instructional theory

-expands on leadership concepts and practical leadership experience



Gold Star -4th Year

-15-16 years old

-More in-depth instructional techniques and practical application

-teaching

-leadership roles



Master Cadet -5th Year + -16-18 years old -focus on planning, leading and mentoring -risk management

-coaching

-conducting activities

Late Joiners

Not everyone joins cadets at 12. That's ok! Cadets who join at a later age will be accelerated and will participate in the Star Level that the other cadets their age are in.

Some opportunities have age requirements, but these will be discussed with your cadet as they arise.

It's never too late to join either, so if your cadet has friends who are interested in participating, encourage them to visit the corps for any training night.

Uniforms

Your cadet will be issued with 2 types of uniform.



Field Training Uniform (FTU)

- Worn for Regular training nights and in the field
- No ironing required. Tumble dry to release wrinkles and hang
- Boots clean and blackened
- Balmoral (headdress)
- Rank slip ons



C1 or Full Dress

- Worn for CO's parades or special events
- Must be ironed
- Boots are polished
- Glenn (headdress)
- Badges sewn on
- Nametag issued
- Regimental Dress (kilts etc.) are issued when the cadet reaches the rank of Master Corporal

First Year:

Promotions

Promotions from Lance Corporal to Sergeant are largely based on time in. Only unacceptable conduct will hinder a cadet's progress.

If your cadet would like to know when to expect a promotion or if they think they have been missed for a promotion, encourage them to talk to any staff member who will be happy to look up their file.

Cadets who want to be considered for a promotion to Warrant Officer, will be given the opportunity to participate in a merit review board where they will discuss their progress in cadets, knowledge of the cadet program, achievements and goals.
